Christopher Vogler's adaptation of the Hero's Journey, based on Joseph Campbell's work, is a twelve-stage narrative structure widely used in storytelling, including film.

1. The Ordinary World

Example: "The Lion King" (1994)

 Simba is introduced in the Pride Lands, where he is a carefree cub destined to become king.

2. The Call to Adventure

Example: "The Matrix" (1999)

 Neo receives messages on his computer screen, prompting him to follow the white rabbit and eventually leading him to Morpheus.

3. Refusal of the Call

Example: "The Hobbit: An Unexpected Journey" (2012)

 Bilbo Baggins initially refuses Gandalf's invitation to join the dwarves on their quest to reclaim Erebor.

4. Meeting with the Mentor

Example: "Star Wars: A New Hope" (1977)

• Luke Skywalker meets Obi-Wan Kenobi, who introduces him to the Force and gives him his father's lightsabre.

5. Crossing the Threshold

Example: "The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring" (2001)

Frodo Baggins leaves the Shire and sets off towards Bree, marking the beginning of his
perilous journey.

6. Tests, Allies, and Enemies

Example: "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone" (2001)

 Harry faces various challenges at Hogwarts, makes friends like Ron and Hermione, and encounters rivals like Draco Malfoy.

Example: "Raiders of the Lost Ark" (1981)

 Indiana Jones prepares to enter the Well of Souls to retrieve the Ark of the Covenant, facing numerous obstacles along the way.

8. Ordeal

Example: "The Lion King" (1994)

 Simba confronts Scar in a climactic battle, facing his fears and doubts about his past and his role as king.

9. Reward (Seizing the Sword)

Example: "The Matrix" (1999)

 Neo accepts his role as "The One," gaining newfound abilities and confidence after rescuing Morpheus and Trinity.

10. The Road Back

Example: "Finding Nemo" (2003)

• **Marlin** and **Dory** navigate back to Sydney Harbour after finding Nemo, facing the last set of challenges to return home.

11. Resurrection

Example: "The Dark Knight" (2008)

 Bruce Wayne/Batman must overcome his darkest fears and the Joker's chaos, emerging as a stronger, more resolved hero.

12. Return with the Elixir

Example: "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone" (2001)

Harry returns to the Dursleys for the summer, but now with the knowledge and experience
of his first year at Hogwarts, and the promise of further adventures ahead.
